No. 1 Jewell ties with Valley, puts ranking in jeopardy

illiam Jewell College still is unbeaten, but it's unlikely the Cardinals will be No. 1 in the next National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Division II football poll after their 14-14 tie with Missouri Valley Saturday in a Heart of America Confer-

ence game in Liberty. William Jewell, 5-0-1, Heart of was in position to deter- America mine its own destiny af-



ter scoring a touchdown with 1 minute, 11 seconds left, Cardinals Coach Vic Wallace chose to kick for one point and a tie instead of going for a two-point conversion that could have won the game.

A loss probably would have tumbled Jewell far down in the rankings and diminished its chances of making the NAIA Division II eight-team playoffs. But Wallace said the poll was not the dominant factor in his decision to take the kick.

"I knew a tie would hurt us less than a loss, but if we hadn't been ranked at all I would have done the same thing." Wallace said. "I figured we could get the ball back and have a legitimate chance to kick a field goal. Valley crossed us up. They showed they were going for the tie by running the ball. If they passed it, we figured we had a chance for an interception. We thought if we got the ball back on their side of the 50, we had a chance to win."

Jewell did get the ball back, on its own 37 with 14 seconds left. After a 7-vard gain on a sideline pass, kickoff man Eddy Adden came in for a 73-yard field-goal attempt. Adden's kick was short.

Valley Coach Ken Gibler, who said his Vikings were a first down away from winning, left no doubt about what he would have done in Wallace's situation. "I'm surprised they didn't go for two." Actually, Jewell could be considered

> fortunate to get out with a tie in its homecoming game before a crowd of 3,789 in Luther Greene Stadium. The Cardinals gained a 7-0 lead in the first half as quarterback Scott Sandridge capped a 57-vard drive with a touchdown from the 1. But Missouri Valley, 3-2-1 domi-

nated play in the half.

The Vikings wer midway through t quarter by a fumb ery at the Jewell back Tony Walker yards for a first do quarterback Don completed an appa vard touchdown pas back Steve Cowan. ings drew a penalt play, but came Cowan on a welldouble-reverse for a touchdown run. Mik lev's conversion score 7-7.

The Vikings moved ahead 14-7 early in the fourth quarter when Winkler completed a 42-yard touchdown pass to split end David McGehee. Winkler escaped a hard rush and found McGehee at the Jewell 5, with no defenders within 20 yards.

"We're in a zone 99 percent of the time." Jewell defensive coordinator Dan Griggs said, "When we go man coverage, we go for the sack. We thought we had the quarterback and our cornerback came up to stop the run."

Two Jewell threats were stopped inside the Missouri Valley 40 in the fourth quarter and Valley appeared in good position for the upset with the ball at its 25 and just under 2 minutes to play. Winkler was trapped on a hird-down bootleg for a 12ard loss, then Bill Babyon's punt went out on the
