



The 1980 William Jewell College football program is dedicated to Dr. M. D. Eubank. An 1890 graduate of William Jewell College, Dr. Eubank was a noted minister, missionary, and physician as well as the captain of William Jewell's first football team in 1888.

#### NINETY TWO YEARS AGO \_ \_ \_

#### THE MUGWUMP GAME

The Year was 1888, Liberty was a thriving town on the frontier and William Jewell College was on the brink of its fortieth anniversary. Pistol shots still rang out in the night to startle the horses lining main street. Grover Cleveland was President of the United States and the Statue of Liberty was two years old. Chief Geronimo was alive and in a federal penetentiary having been captured two years earlier. Members of Jesse James' gang were still at large and the wild west was still a reality.

On a cool fall afternoon, one might take a buggy ride with one's sweetheart, visit the county fair, or watch a William Jewell College football game. Yes, you read correctly, for ninety two years ago Jewell's first organized football team took to the playing field.

Although details on this team are extremely sketchy, we do know that it was captained by M. D. Eubank. This Jewell graduate was to become M. D. Eubank, M.D. and serve as a medical missionary to China. Although we know little of their particular games, we do have knowledge of how they were played and few of us here would have recognized it as football. Here is a description of the game M. D. Eubank played.

The scoring system had been adopted four years earlier and allowed 1 point for safety; 2 for TD; 4 for point-after-TD; 5 for field goal. The "flying wedge" was the standard kickoff play and there was no limit to the number of men allowed in the backfield.

Football players were easily identified by their long bushy hair, which was grown to prevent head injuries. Helmets were not yet worn and no standard uniforms would exist for another seven years. The ball was not centered to the quarter back, the center kicked it back with his heel and unlimited contact was allowed before the snap.

The below waist tackle was a new rule in 1888 and the concept of using a "lead blocker" was being invented. The first All-American team was a year away and Amos Alonzo Stagg would be a member.

The Forward Pass was still unknown and would not be legalized for 18 years and then only as a means to prevent deaths from running plays (there were 18 in 1905). As the 1896 *William Jewell Student* states, "Football is no 'parlor game' in which 'hot house plants' may indulge." How true, then and now! (excerpt from 1916 article by Dr. M. D. Eubank) We bought our first football in the fall of 1888. We were not encouraged to play regular football. We were advised that the great men before us got their exercise by sawing wood, milking cows, etc. We were told that good long walks were healthy if taken with other male students — no walks with females advised.

We began our first football down in the S.W. corner of the campus (site of current fields). We did not play Soccer, nor Rugby, but a sort of mugwump game. (Ed. note: mugwump refers to a desertion of true standards). We worked out rules to suit ourselves and this lasted for two years.

We wanted to get up a real team and play like other schools. I soon got in touch with the Y.M.C.A, coach from Kansas City and he came over and gave us lessons. We learned a few signals, then learned "hay foot, straw foot," and we thought we could play anybody. We were strong enough, had we been trained.

The Y.M.C.A. coach brought his team over to play us. We looked them over, they were mere boys. I, being a student of the ministry, thought it would not be nice for us to be too rough with the little boys. I weighed 197 and was center, Charley Bullard was to my right and weighed 190. We were strong enough to carry any four of the boys off the field had we known how to catch them. The whistle blew and something happened, what it was I do not know, but those little boys came through the line. Bullard and Eubank were down, dust was flying, or something like it. Bullard could not see, and Eubank was not a whit better off. We felt like the boy the drove of sheep ran over. We professed to do better, but before we could figure out what was up, we found ourselves all down again. We seemed to be doing all the playing, but the Kansas City boys did all the scoring. It was skill, and co-operation against strength and awkwardness. Skill and co-operation got it!



### The Coaching Staff



#### STAN McGARVEY HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Head Coach Stan McGarvey begins his third season as the Coach of the Cardinals in 1980. McGarvey was unanimously chosen NAIA District 16 Coach of the Year in 1979 after his team finished their season as Co-Champions of the tough Heart of America Athletic Conference and ranked #9 in the Nation in Division II.

Coach McGarvey graduated from William Jewell in 1973 and spent five years as an assistant coach at four different institutions before being named head Cardinal Coach. During that time he was involved in an undefeated season and a trip by the University of Kentucky to the Peach Bowl. McGarvey came to the Jewell post from the University of Tulsa, where he served as running back coach as well as coordinator of Tulsa's highly regarded recruiting program.



#### STEVE BUTLER WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

Coach Steve Butler graduated from William Jewell College in 1976 with a degree in physical education. He was a member of the Jewell football team three years and holds the school conference, and NAIA records for the most consecutive points after touchdown in one season with 33 set in 1974. He was twice named all-conference and alldistrict and was a member of the team in 1973 which holds the record as the winningest team in William Jewell history.

A graduate of the Albany RIII High School, Albany, Mo., Butler is the Home School Coordinator and an Assistant Administrator at Liberty High School. Steve, who is single, holds a Master's Degree from UMKC.



#### DANNY CARTER RUNNING BACK COACH

Danny, a 1979 graduate of William Jewell, will see the game of football from the other side this year as he joins the coaching staff in charge of the running backs. Coach Carter, who is single, will be involved in youth work with the Southern Baptist Convention while he is not performing his coaching duties.



#### JAMES WALTER GRAY LINEBACKER COACH

Jim Gray, last year's offensive line coach, has switched his talents to the linebacking crew for this season. Jim comes to William Jewell from Roanoke Catholic School where he was the offensive line coach for two years. He attended West Virginia State College where he majored in Criminal Justice with a minor in Recreation and Communication.

Mr. Gray's football experience includes four years as an all-conference linebacker at Jefferson Senior High School and four years at West Virginia State College where he earned all-conference honors for three years. In addition, "Pepper" as he is known to his friends, is pursuing his MA in Education at CMSU.



#### DAN GRIGGS DEFENSIVE BACKFIELD COACH Dan attended St. Pius X High School in Kansas City, Mo. where he was a three-

sport letterman, an all-conference player in both football and basketball and was voted as Outstanding Athlete of his senior class. After graduating in 1969, he came to William Jewell and lettered in football three years. Obtaining his degree in physical education, Dan received his diploma in 1973 and began his coaching career at Liberty High School as assistant coach. During his stay at Liberty, the Jays were 26-10-1, won one conference title, finished second twice, and participated in the Missouri 4A state play-offs once.

For the past two years, Dan has been head coach at Oak Grove High School, Oak Grove, Missouri. This past season, his Panther team finished second in conference, their highest ever, and had their first winning season in eight years. This summer, Dan coached in the secondary at the Lion's East-West All Star game in Jefferson City. Dan and his wife Karen have two children, Jay, 6 and Krissi, 3.



#### RODGER LaBETH DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

Rodger, a 1968 graduate of William Jewell College, will again be assisting the Cardinals this season. Coach LaBeth, as a 160 pound offensive guard, played on the first undefeated team in William Jewell history.

Following his graduation from William Jewell, LaBeth coached at Oak Grove High School and earned a Master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University. Rodger now serves as Associate Director of Athletics and Director of the Mabee Center for Physical Education at WJC. He and his wife Susan have three children and reside in Kansas City.



#### JAMES A. NELSON OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Coach "Jim" Nelson returns to the Gridiron at William Jewell College after a two year absence. After earning a Bachelor's degree from Missouri Valley College, Coach Nelson obtained his MA in education from UMKC. After a highly successful high school coaching career, Jim came to William Jewell in 1950. Serving as head coach from 1968 until 1977, Coach Nelson compiled a record of 64 wins, 41 losses, and 2 ties and holds the distinction of having coached the only Jewell team to compete in the NAIA championships and the winningest team in WJC history. He and his wife Kathryn reside in Liberty and have four children.


HARRY HUTSELL Liberty, MO Harry, a 1949 graduate of Transylvania, is associated with Realty World and his wife's name is Norma.

#### EIGHTY YEARS OF FOOTBALL AT WJC

In this year's football program, we have included descriptions of games for each decade, beginning with 1900. We hope you enjoy reliving Jewell's exciting years on the gridiron.

1900 William Jewell, 28

### Westport, 0

Dateline: October 27. This was an easy game for the Jewells with the visitors being outclassed generally. For the home team, "Baby" Garnett made a 100 yard run for a touchdown.

#### 1910 William Jewell, 6 Central, 6

Dateline: October 22. The Jewells met Central Mo. State on Jewell's gridiron. The game was called at 3:15 and both teams being very evenly matched, the game was hard fought throughout.

After the first five minutes of play, the "Jewells" succeeded in making line bucks and shoved Boyer over the line for a touchdown. The ball was kicked off again and before the end of the first quarter, Central succeeded in making an end run for a touchdown. The final score was Central, 6, William Jewell, 6.

#### 1920 Jewell Shares M.I.A.A. Title

Dateline: November 30. William Jewell and Missouri Wesleyan battled to a scoreless tie before a crowd estimated at 3,500.

The Big Red Gang outplayed the "Cameroons" every minute of the contest. After a few minutes, Wesleyan saw that making a score on the Cardinal crew was going to be a difficult task, so all efforts were concentrated upon holding the Jewell chargers scoreless, thus enabling the maroon and black to end the season with a clean slate, as tie games are not reckoned in the standings. Punt after punt was made by the Cameroon eleven on the first down, in order to keep the ball out of scoring distance. Wesleyan attempted to make gains by the aerial route in the second quarter, at one time making three flings in a row, but this strategy was unsuccessful as the Cardinals got down and incompleted each flip that was tried.

#### 1930 Cardinals Beat Vikings 14-7

Dateline: November 5. The work of "Polly' Grant was outstanding and his broken field running caused the crowd to sit up and take notice on several occasions when he threatened to run over the entire Valley team on his return of punts. His touchdown early in the second half secured the home victory.

#### 1940 Cardinals 18, Tarkio 0

Dateline: October 28. In the second quarter, an Owl fumble and a Jewell recovery gives the Cardinals possession on the Tark's 40. Bud Anderson tossed a long pass to Danny Wilkins for 29 yards but the ball was lost on downs at the four. On the next possession, Anderson rifled a pass to Bill Cunningham who awaited it on the goal line. Cunningham's leaping catch was a high twist into the air.

Then came a trick out of Godfiaux's bag. When quarterback Wilkins took the ball, he started around left end but lateraled to Dick Hyder. He proceeded a few yards toward the sidelines and tossed the ball back to Anderson who followed the previous ball handlers across the goal line.

Dateline: September 29. Marty Schweling of Culver Stockton sprinted 80 yards with a first quarter punt return before being dragged down by Sam Childress at the ten-yard line. In the second quarter, Childress put the Cards ahead on a 43 yard run. The second Jewell touchdown came on a pass from Tom Travis to Jack Hansen and the fourth quarter saw Clem Buschmann slog through a sea of mud with two deep penetrating runs.

#### 1970 Big Red 20-16 Over Graceland

Dateline: October 15. Led by the passing of Tom Geer, the William Jewell football Cardinals scored a 20-16 come-frombehind victory over Graceland Saturday. Jewell's first score was by Linzy Teegarden and this was followed by Graceland score by Cottrell. A Dan Brown reception from Geer for a score was followed by another to Gary Hosack with Bill Womack adding the PAT. Graceland was stopped on downs at the Cardinal 30 with three seconds remaining.

#### Sports Note: Rivalries

Our oldest continuous rivalry is with Ottawa U. beginning in 1897.

### Sports Note: Determination

William Jewell played Kansas University six times from 1905 to 1914 never scoring a single point until 1914 when they were defeated by Kansas 48-8. Having finally reached that scoring milestone, they terminated the competition. Final score for all six games, WJC, 8 and KU, 199.

Sports Note: Never again

Jewell's worst loss came at the hands of Wake Forest, 79-0 in 1940. It was the only time the Deacons were scheduled.

Sports Note: Boy that's weird.

Jewell's second best defensive team (allowed only 64 points) in 1931 won only two football games during the entire season. Their offense scored only 41 points in nine games.

Sports Note: Revenge is sweet.

In 1943, Jewell beat Missouri Valley 34-0 revenging 1942's 59-0 defeat by the Vikings.

Sports Note: What happened coach?

In 1928 after four games, Jewell was 2-2 outscoring their opponents by 59-38. Over the next five years, the team scored 6 points.

Sports Note: Who says lightning can't strike twice?

In 1929 after four games, Jewell was 4-0 outscoring their opponents by 41-8. Over the remaining four games, they scored only 6 points.


Sports Note: Would the offense please report to the Stadium?

In 1928, Jewell defeated Culver Stockton 33-0. Following this offensive show, the Cardinals had to wait 69 games before they again scored more than two touchdowns in a contest (WJC 21-Central 0, 1936). For eight years, the offense averaged less than six points per game.




#### LARRY HAMILTON MEN'S ATHLETIC DIRECTOR


