Welcome to Washington University

Brief History of Washington University

Washington University came into being on February 22, 1853 as Eliot Seminary, a name chosen in honor of William Greenleaf Eliot, a Unitarian minister who guided the new university through the first three decades of its existence. It was his wish that the original name be changed, first to Washington Institute, and then to Washington University.

The University's history through its first half-century is one of peril, dotted with moves from a single building on Sixth Street, to its first official home at Nineteenth and Washington, and finally to its present location at Skinker and Lindell.

The last change was made possible by the purchase of a 155 acre tract just west of Forest Park, and was greatly facilitated by the St. Louis World's Fair of 1904.

This ''Louisiana Purchase Exposition'' of 1904 permitted the University to rent to the Fair the first buildings constructed on the new campus, an arrangement that amounted to an economy of some seven hundred thousand dollars.

The foresight and business acumen of the men who were guiding the University at that time removed it for more than a half-century from any major need for expansion land. Only in 1959 was the last sizeable tract, some forty acres, used as a site for new residence halls, opened to the development.

Located on the western edge of Forest Park, the grass covered, tree-lined campus is one of the most attractive in the country.

The beauty of Washington University, however, is more than skin deep, for within the walls of its Gothic buildings are



some of the most able administrators and brilliant scholars available.

Offering a complete curriculum in Liberal Arts, Engineering, Fine Arts, Architecture, Business Law, Social Work, and all phases of medicine, Washington University has a proud place among the finest academic institutions in American higher education.





