Loss to Baker gives Jewell more incentive

Many coaches can look to one game during the course of a season where a victory turned the team around.

Baker handed Jewell a 10-0 decision three weeks ago, a decision that virtually ended the Cardinals' quest or the Heart of America Athletic Conference title. But Jewell wanted to keep a string of playoff appearances alive and the players have responded with two wins to raise the Cardinals ecord to 7-1-1, good enough for a No. 7 anking in NAIA Division II.

"We went through a couple of periods early in the season where we weren't playing very good football," Vallace said. "But we've been laying real aggressive, technically ound football the last few weeks.

"I think we played an excellent ame against Baker and we lost. But here has been a big turnaround. ince that ball game we've played well.

"Our players came out of that game freshed. It wasn't just the loss, but or the first time all year we gave a stal effort. Now we've just exploded fensively and defensively and our layers realize that it is fun.

"It was an important game at the time from the standpoint that it did propel us into high gear. Now this is the most important game of the year, because if we win it, we're in the playoffs and have a shot at the national championship."

Jewell today travels to Tarkio, 3-6, for the regular-season finale. The Cardinals need a victory to stay in the playoff hunt. Come Sunday, the NAIA will take the top eight ranked teams and seed them in the playoffs. A loss would probably knock Jewell out of the top eight.

In other HoA games, leagues champion Baker hosts Central Methodist and Culver-Stockton is at Mid-America Nazarene. Graceland winds up its season with a non-conference game at Southwest Baptist (Mo.). Missouri Valley finished the season last week and is ranked 17th in NAIA Division II.

Central Methodist at Baker: Central Methodist, 1-8 overall and 1-5 in the league, is a sacrificial lamb in this game. Baker wants to complete its season unbeaten and untied but also wants a shutout to tie an NAIA record with six shutouts this season. Baker, ranked No. 3 in Division II, has the top defensive team in the NAIA in terms of points and yardage allowed.
